bbreviation
The shortened version of a word

Adjective
A word which describes a noun

- ferocious bear, burning sun

Adverb
A word which describes a verb

- quickly, slowly, angrily

AIliteration
A phrase with words which begin with the same phoneme/sound

- Angry ants answer Anna

A word with a meaning opposite to another

- Hot/cold, light/dark

Combining phonemes to make clusters, syllables or words - $\mathrm{f}-\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{a}-\mathrm{g}=\mathrm{flag}$
ompound Words
A word made up of two other words

- football, playground

onnective
Words and phrases used to link sentences and clauses
- after, next, because, also, however, just then

onsonant
All letters except the five vowels are consonants
- $b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k I, m, n, p q, r, s t, v, w, x, y, z$

$G$rapheme
Written representation of a sound; this may consist of one or more letters

- ch, a,th

omophone
Words which sound the same but have different meaning

- their / there / they're, hare / hair

Metaphor
Where the writer writes about something as if it were something else

- The wind was a howling wolf.

Morpheme The smallest unit of meaning - suffixes and rpefixes are morphemes

- House, un, ing

Words which echo sound associated with their meaning

- Clang, hiss, crash, bang

A form of a metaphor in which language relating to human action, motivation and emotion is used to refer to objects or abstract concepts

- The trees sighed in the gentle breeze

## honeme

The smallest unit of sound - a phoneme can be represented by one or more letters

- Ch, p, ay, igh
lural
A form of verb, noun, or pronoun which indicates more than one - Foxes, bags, cherries, children
reposition
A small word in front of a noun, often indicating direction or place
- On, under, between

refix
A morpheme which can be added to the beginning of a word to change its meaning

- Un, pre, dis


## ronoun

A word used instead of a noun or noun phrase

- He, I, you, they
